

HOME MISSIONS COLLECTION

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Catholic Home Missions Appeal supports dioceses in the United States and its territories that lack the resources to provide basic pastoral ministry to their populations. Through annual grants, Catholic Home Missions funds catechesis, seminarian education, lay ministry training, Hispanic ministry, and other pastoral programs in dioceses in need. As a result of parishioners' generosity, Catholic Home Missions impacts the lives of nearly 9 million Catholics. The dioceses funded by the Appeal comprise nearly 45 percent of all U.S. dioceses.

The state of Mississippi has the highest number of families living below the poverty line in the U.S., as well as the lowest per capita income and a low level of formal education. For the Diocese of Jackson, these challenges are combined with an immense area—the diocese encompasses two-thirds of the state—and only a small number of Catholics. One of the biggest problems is a lack of priests to reach people under these difficult circumstances. The head of the diocese, Bishop Joseph N. Latino, commented on this shortage, "I've buried more priests than I've ordained in my 10 years of tenure." With limited resources, this reality hits this home mission diocese hard. A grant from Catholic Home Missions helps cover the cost of educating the diocese's 10 seminarians, whose education each costs \$35,000–\$37,000 per year. As future priests of the diocese, these men will bring the sacraments and provide a Catholic presence to the faithful.

A mission diocese often times must compete with high rates of poverty and a lack of educated pastoral and lay leadership to serve the community. With your support, the Catholic Home Missions Appeal can continue to provide essential pastoral outreach in home mission dioceses.

Our diocese takes up this Collection this weekend of February 8-9, 2014. If you missed using your envelope this week, please be as generous as you are able next week in the Catholic Home Missions Appeal and help strengthen the Church at home. Your support will truly make a difference. Thank you and God bless you.

Go Green!

If you cannot get out to the fire station in Naperville (as mentioned in last week’s bulletin) to recycle some hazardous waste materials, here are two alternatives:

Home Depot is collecting CFL’s. Just make sure that they are sealed in a plastic bag.
Lisle Police Department, 5040 Lincoln Avenue is collecting drugs that are no longer needed or have expired date codes, prescription or over the counter. Place these in a sealed plastic bag.

- ✦ Different medications can be mixed in the same bag.
- ✦ Do not include pill bottles or pill packaging. This will assist in reducing program costs and ensure that drop-off program participants remain anonymous.
- ✦ For liquid medications, cross out any personal information with a permanent marker on the prescription bottle and place the container in a sealed plastic bag. Double-bagging the container is recommended to ensure the contents do not leak.
- ✦ **No needles, sharp medical supplies or other hazardous waste will be accepted.**
- ✦ Inhaler canisters without the plastic mouthpiece/casing will be accepted. Place the canisters in a plastic bag.

Human Trafficking Awareness

Illinois Women Religious Against Human Trafficking

The United Nations currently estimates human trafficking to be the fastest growing criminal enterprise in the world, second only to drug trafficking in terms of illicit money. Experts believe that 27 million people around the world live in slavery, and between 14-17,000 people are brought to the United States for exploitation as domestic servants, restaurant workers, janitors, agricultural workers, seamstresses, factory workers or in the commercial sex trade. Runaway children in the United States are at high risk.
